Letter from the Reverend Beverley Vincent

We are fast approaching Easter which falls in the middle of April this year. Easter is a season all about hope and I really wanted to find some hopeful words to share with you this month.

We have watched with disbelief and horror as the Russian invasion of Ukraine has unfolded. We have seen through the extensive news coverage the brutal destruction of Ukraine's homes, hospitals, schools and towns and the human suffering wrought on innocent civilians, many of them women and children. We see bewilderment and fear on the faces of the displaced and our hearts are broken for what is lost and threatened.



The plight of the Ukrainian people is part of the ongoing story of humanity's inhumanity as people of power and tyranny battle to keep the upper hand. Every time this situation happens in our world we cry out with horror and vow that it must never happen again and yet, even with the refugee crises in Syria and Afghanistan still fresh in our minds we find another humanitarian disaster unfolding. How can we respond to what is happening?

We can, of course give generously of our money and practical help to send supplies of humanitarian aid to Ukraine and countries receiving refugees. We may be able to open our homes to displaced individuals and families but sometimes all we can do is pray. But prayer can be hard. Sometimes it is hard to see where a loving God is in all of this. But I believe God hears our prayers and weeps with the people of Ukraine because God has seen humanity inflict suffering so many times before.

The Easter story is one of suffering and death for Jesus, a man of peace and love and because Jesus trod that road to the cross he understands the human suffering of each Ukrainian soul and walks beside them today. Each Easter we remember that Jesus, despite his suffering and death rose from the dead to new life. Ultimately the Easter story ends with triumph that love and hope prevails, that good conquers evil.

The Easter story tells us that hope is stronger than despair, that love is stronger than hate, that peace is stronger than war and that life is stronger than death. This Easter I pray that this will be true for the people of Ukraine and for a world that longs for hope, love, peace and life. Please continue to pray for the people of Ukraine and for peace.



More Little Maplestead

Fibre Broadband for little Maplestead

As you are aware County Broadband have been around the village laying cables for the last few months. There is also another Company 'Gigaclear' who have received government funding to supply fibre broadband to parts of the village.

It appears that once the infrastructure is completed County Broadband will have the ability to supply the whole village, and Gigaclear will have the ability to supply Cock Road, School Road, and the part of Gestingthorpe Road/Oak Road, and the main Sudbury road between the two, as well as Collins Road.

This does mean that residents in those areas will have a choice of which company offers the best deal for their needs.

There are no specific dates when either company will complete their works. County Broadband have stated that they are currently waiting for the handover from their contractors. Once this is received, tests will be carried out to ensure everything is working as it should, and the customer services department will contact people who may be interested to proceed with their connection.

Gigaclear have stated that the plans at present are to go live during May. There are further road closures scheduled for the village in line with the chart below.

Nature Notes

Spring has certainly sprung over the last month, with birdsong, butterflies and new spring flowers everywhere you look. On a walk on February 16th there were Skylarks up singing along with Dunnock and even a Goldcrest. The bare Hazel branches were gleaming yellow with Catkins and of course the Snowdrops were in full glory. The week of the storms arrested progress, but I couldn't help but notice how even the tiniest birds were still managing to fly in the gale force winds and continuing to access the feeders.



On Feb 22nd a beautiful male Siskin briefly visited my peanut feeder. It was only the second for the garden in five years and proved to be the last of the winter surprises. They are winter visitors to Essex and breed much further north in Britain. Bright greeny-yellow with wing bars, darker streaks and a glossy black crown and chin, it is a very smart bird.

On the 2nd of March I inadvertently

left the porch light on and next morning there was a lovely moth on the outside of the door. It was a Shoulder Stripe, an early spring species that overwinters as a pupa in a cocoon among loose earth. The caterpillars feed on Dog-rose and the adults have finished by May.

A week later it was a nice warm, sunny day and the first butterflies appeared; a Brimstone followed soon after by a Comma. Both these species hibernate as adults and respond quickly to early spring warmth. On the same day I discovered a tiny (2-inch) Common Lizard behind bark I had removed from a log. It seemed to be dead but once it warmed in my hand it came to life and scuttled away. This was the first lizard for my garden – I did report sightings by others last autumn, when they look for places to hide away for winter and do come into houses.

Everyone notes the first Cuckoo calling and the first Swallows seen, the harbingers of summer. Two of the commonest warblers breeding in Essex are the Blackcap and the Chiffchaff and both over-winter here. The first Blackcap singing was on the 6th of March, very early for this species, and the first Chiffchaff was today (15th March) in Pebmarsh, which is about the time you would expect to hear them. The Blackcap has a jerky but melodious song while the Chiffchaff reveals the source of its name when it sings; a monotonous, endlessly repeated, chiff-chaff, chiff-chaff.

Gardening Corner

I trust your gardens have survived the storms we experienced in February and any seeds in propagators were not lost. Personally, I spent a whole day picking up rubbish that had blown into or around my 'patch'.

Any bulbs grown for the house can be planted outside once they have finished flowering – remember to plant them at least to the depth of the bulb and not on the surface. Bulbs grown for indoor displays are often standing proud of the container when purchased.

Continue to use any mature home-made compost; spread around shrubs and climbers it will act as a mulch and soil improver.



My recommended plant of the month (which was at its best last month) is Sweet Box [Sarcococca confuse], a hardy shrub that exudes a heady fragrance and is evergreen. A friend of mine has a small hedge of this glossy show-stopper under the lounge window and the perfume enters the house even when the window is open just a chink.

Lawns benefit from raking at this time of year, removing as much of the compacted 'thatch' as possible and at the same time removing moss. If you feed your grass, now is a good time but try and time the job with forecast rain to wash the stimulant down to the roots and avoid burning, which can happen if a granular weed and feed is left on the surface for too long.

Although we have had a wet winter, keep an eye on pots and containers near to a wall or building overhang it is surprising how quickly they dry out. This will help empty your water butts!

Container shrubs can be planted now while the soil has plenty of moisture in it. Make the hole half as wide again as the root ball so you can incorporate plenty of compost and soil alongside. Firm down with your heel to avoid air pockets.

Second early potatoes, broad beans, onion sets and shallots can be planted this month, as can parsnip seed and early peas.

April's Cooking and Baking

Easy Greek-style Chicken tray bake

Ingredients:

2 aubergines sliced into circles;

1 red pepper, thickly sliced;

1 red onion, cut into wedges;

8 new potatoes, scrubbed and cut in half;

3 tbsp olive oil;

2 tsp red wine vinegar;

3 garlic cloves, thinly sliced;

1 tsp dried oregano;

2 sprigs of rosemary;

6 chicken thighs on the bone;

2 tomatoes, quartered, or 8 cherry tomatoes;

150g/5½oz feta, cut into chunks;

Small bunch mint leaves, roughly chopped, to serve;

Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method:

Warm oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6. Put the aubergines, pepper, onion and potatoes in a large roasting dish and drizzle over a mixture of olive oil and vinegar – roughly 2 tbs. Sprinkle over the garlic, oregano, rosemary and season with salt and pepper.

Cover the dish with kitchen foil and roast for 40 minutes.

Heat the remaining tbs of olive oil in a frying pan. Add the chicken thighs, skin-side down, and cook until golden or crispy. Turn the thighs over and cook for a few more minutes.

Turn the oven up to 220C/200C Fan/Gas 7. Scatter the tomatoes and feta evenly over the roasting dish on top of the vegetables. Place the chicken thighs on top, skin-side up. Roast uncovered for 15–20 minutes.

Remove from the oven and check the chicken has been cooked thoroughly.

Garnish the bake with the mint and serve with a simple salad.


